day clinical workshop in Mexico.



### 18th Annual Conference of the ISBD: Challenging Mood

ISBD's 2016 meeting saw the highest attendance in the history of our conference. The 2016 meeting was held 13-17 July in Amsterdam along with the International Society for Affective Disorders, KenBiS (the Dutch Chapter of ISBD), the Association for Manic Depressives and Relatives (VMDB) and Fonds Psychische Gezondheid. The collaboration among Societies yielded a meeting that expanded the breadth of the topics to cover unipo-

ISBD welcomed two new chapters in Iran and Guatemala this year, bringing the total number of ISBD chapters to 24. A total of 13 ISBD chapters held events in support of World Bipolar Day (WBD) in 2016, and we congratulate the leaders in Argentina, Australia, Austria, Chile, Denmark, France, India, Iran, Italy, Korea, Mexico, the Netherlands, and Turkey for their participation.



In addition to these events, ISBD held a screening of the film "No Letting Go" in Pittsburgh, which featured the writer, Randi Silverman, and Dr. Boris Birmaher among a panel who addressed the challenges of proper diagnosis and treatment of pediatric bipolar disorder immediately following the film.






