

Australian Doctors' Perspectives on the Safety of Psilocybin-Assisted Therapy (PAP) for Bipolar Depression

About the Study:

Bipolar depression presents significant clinical challenges, with existing treatments often providing limited relief. Psilocybin-assisted psychotherapy has shown promise in treating major depression, but its application in bipolar depression remains largely unexplored. We are inviting Australian general practitioners and psychiatrists to contribute to a research study conducted by the School of Medicine and Psychology at The Australian National University (ANU). This study aims to explore doctors' perspectives on the safety and potential of psilocybin-assisted psychotherapy (PAP) in treating bipolar depression.

Participant Eligibility:

- General practitioners (GPs) or psychiatrists.
- Currently residing in Australia a holding and valid Australian medical license.

What Participation Involves:

Completing an online survey that takes approximately 20–30 minutes.

The survey will cover:

- Your demographic information.
- Your expertise in treating bipolar disorder.
- Your attitudes, knowledge, and beliefs about psilocybin.
